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# Correspondence courses

## Bible Study Skills

*BibStud103C • 3 semester hours*

Consisting of three modules which may be taken separately, this course considers the unique characteristics of the Bible and the principles of interpreting which need to be applied when seeking to understand its meaning. This course will enable you to study Scripture in a much richer and meaningful way, as you learn the tools to unlock the depth of God's Word to you.

## Baptist History and Spirituality

*BHist103C • 3 semester hours*

A study of the history of the Baptists, especially focusing on the English Calvinistic Baptists from the early seventeenth century to the late nineteenth century, and the Canadian Baptist experience in Ontario from the late eighteenth to the mid-twentieth centuries. The two major goals of the course are to inform the student about the key events, personalities, and texts of English and Canadian Baptist history; and then, to provide the student with an awareness of the Baptist distinctives, convictions and spirituality of some of his or her Baptist forebears.

## The Early Church

*CHist103C • 3 semester hours*

This in-depth study of the history of the Early Church takes the student from the end of the Apostolic era (c.100 A.D.) up to the time of Synod of Whitby (664). Special attention is given to the development of the doctrine of the Trinity, the relationship of church and culture, and Christian spirituality.

## Evangelicalism in the Modern World: 1500 to 1900's

*CHist303C • 3 semester hours*

A detailed study of the Magisterial Reformers, the English Puritans, and Western Evangelicals since the eighteenth century. Topics discussed include the nature of the Reformation, the theology of the Puritans, revival in the 18th and 19th centuries, and how Evangelicalism has sought to maintain a faithful witness in the modern world.

## Pastoral Epistles

*PastEp103C • 3 semester hours*

A study of Paul's writings. Walk with Paul through the time, verse by verse, and get a better understanding for Paul's work, his drive, God's purpose, see pastoral roles, the woman's role, how we should respond to false teaching and determine what Paul accomplished for Christians in his day and for us today.

## Western Civilization: Its History and Heritage Ancient World

*WHist103C • 3 semester hours*

This module studies the roots of the literary, cultural, social and political history and heritage of Western Civilization in the Ancient World. In particular, focus is placed on the Greek and Roman experience, the impact of Christianity on the Roman Empire, the rise and development of Islam, and developments in the Middle Ages.

## Western Civilization: Its History and Heritage from the Renaissance on

*WHist103C • 3 semester hours*

In this module the student studies the roots of the literary, cultural, social and political history and heritage of Western Civilization from the Renaissance. In particular focus is placed on the literary and cultural impact of the Renaissance and the Reformation, the Enlightenment and the revivals of the eighteenth and nineteenth centuries, the American and French revolutions, the influence of the industrial revolution, the social and intellectual significance of this century's two world wars, and the importance of the 1960's in giving shape to modern culture.
