Course Requirements


- External students may start at any time during the year.
- Full-time students or students attending class-based instruction may only register for correspondence courses at the same time as their regular semester classes.
- Courses must be completed within six months of registration.*

Correspondence courses

Bible Study Skills

BibStud103C • 3 semester hours

Consisting of three modules, this course considers the unique characteristics of the Bible and the principles of interpreting which need to be applied when seeking to understand its meaning. This course will enable you to study Scripture in a much richer and meaningful way, as you learn the tools to unlock the depth of God's Word to you.

Baptist History and Spirituality

BHist103On/123On • 3 semester hours

A study of the history of the Baptists, especially focusing on the English Calvinistic Baptists from the early seventeenth century to the late nineteenth century, and the Canadian Baptist experience in Ontario from the late eighteenth to the mid-twentieth centuries. The two major goals of the course are to inform the student about the key events, personalities, and texts of English and Canadian Baptist history; and then, to provide the student with an awareness of the Baptist distinctives, convictions and spirituality of some of his or her Baptist forebears.

This course is available on-line and has audio recordings of the lectures delivered by Dr. M. A. G. Haykin. There is no exam for this course.

The Early Church

CHist103C/123On • 3 semester hours

This in-depth study of the history of the Early Church takes the student from the end of the Apostolic era (c.100 A.D.) up to the time of Synod of Whitby (664). Special attention is given to the development of the doctrine of the Trinity, the relationship of church and culture, and Christian spirituality.

Evangelicalism in the Modern World: 1500 to 1900's

CHist303C/323On • 3 semester hours

A detailed study of the Magisterial Reformers, the English Puritans, and Western Evangelicals since the eighteenth century. Topics discussed include the nature of the Reformation, the theology of the Puritans, revival in the 18th and 19th centuries, and how Evangelicalism has sought to maintain a faithful witness in the modern world.

Pastoral Epistles

PastEp103C • 3 semester hours

A study of Paul's writings. Walk with Paul through the time, verse by verse, and get a better understanding for Paul's work, his drive, God's purpose, see pastoral roles, the woman's role, how we should respond to false teaching and determine what Paul accomplished for Christians in his day and for us today.

Christian Foundations

Found 103 On • 3 semester hours

This module serves as an introduction to the language and systems of Christian theology. Nine areas of systematic theology will be surveyed, with an emphasis on thinking biblically and theologically in all areas of life. A Christian world-view will be emphasized. Over the module, God's unfolding plan of redemption in the Old and New Testament scriptures will be accentuated, as well as the centrality of Jesus Christ as the one who holds the scriptures together, as we attempt to understand the message of the Bible.

This course is available on-line and has audio recordings of the lectures delivered by Prof K Wellum. There is no exam for this course.
