DR. SHIELDS' SILVER JUBILEE

The Sunday Morning Service

We surprised our pastor, Dr. Shields. To get all the means was no small task, and to keep state secrets from one who is like "the king's eye", as the ancients would say, was almost as difficult. But when we sprang the third surprise, the Doctor declared ours a house of secrets!

We did this in celebration of Dr. Shields' Silver Jubilee as Pastor of Jarvis St. Baptist Church, and great times we all had.

Sunday morning the Pastor and I entered the pulpit together,—nothing unusual,—and the Doctor offered the invocation and announced the first hymn, "O could I speak the matchess worth". Seeing Rev. Alex. Thompson, of Mount Pleasant Road Baptist Church, in the audience, he asked him to lead in the morning prayer. Then the Junior Choir sang, a tiny girl taking the solo, the older girls the two-part verse, and all the boys and girls joining heartily in their turn.

Greetings, Congratulations, Good Wishes

Now we must take the service out of the Pastor's hands—a very unusual procedure! Rev. Alex. Thompson is this year President of the Union of Regular Baptist Churches of Ontario and Quebec, so he spoke briefly on their behalf and read excerpts from greetings sent by its pastors and churches. No sooner had he concluded than we called upon Rev. W. S. Whitcombe, Seminary Instructor in Systematic Theology and in English, to present further greetings. His first group was from heads of some other Evangelical schools. Then he read a few of the warm congratulations to the Seminary's President that had come from its graduates and former students in this and other lands. (See page 9.)

Words From the Ends of the Earth

That was a good point at which to take the offering. We suggested that it be devoted to the Seminary treasury, to which the people agreed. After that we proceeded with congratulations, sent by letter, telegram and cable, from a host of friends of far and near,—Toronto, across Canada and the United States, throughout the British Isles, from Belgium and France, Jerusalem and New Zealand, China and Manchuria. In many ways but with one accord, they spoke of the man who had completed twenty-five years of work in Jarvis St. Church as a preacher of the glorious Good News, defender of the faith and leader against the forces of unbelief. We print parts of the greetings below; read and rejoice.

Deacon George Greenway, for many years associated with the Pastor, then took the platform to read an address, (a facsimile appears on the front page) beautifully illuminated by a member of the Church, which, in permanent form, succinctly expressed our heart's feelings toward Dr. Shields. All rose and sang, "Praise God from Whom all blessings flow".

Now, at last, after an hour—in spite of great brevity—it was the Pastor's turn to speak. His reply, made with great feeling, thanking the friends one and all for their gracious words, and appealing for greater devotion to our common Lord, was as follows:

Mr. Brown, Mr. Thomson, Mr. Greenway, Mr. Whitcombe, and Christian friends:

I find it difficult to express what is in my heart this morning. I came to this service intending to preach, knowing

absolutely nothing of the programme that has been carried out thus far. How these brethren got in touch with people in all parts of the world, I do not know—apparently there are a great many people in Jarvis Street who know how to keep a secret.

I am most grateful for the loyalty, first of all, of the members of Jarvis Street Church. Without their splendid cooperation, long patience, and extraordinary endurance, I am sure this record could not have been written.

Naturally, my mind has been going back for twenty-five years. I have thought of a great number of people who have worshipped in this place, who are no longer with us, but who have gone to that happy land of which the children so beautifully sang, a few moments ago. Last evening one of the students brought me a message. He said, speaking of a certain Canadian city: "I met a man a while ago who told me that years ago he was in one of your services"—somewhere, I do not know where it was. He was a Roman Catholic. This student continued: "Somehow you met him, and when you found that he was a Roman Catholic you did not argue with him, but you put your hand on his shoulder and said, 'Remember, there is one Mediator between God and man, the man Jesus Christ'." And he said: "That quotation of scripture was used of God to lead that man out of the darkness of Rome into the full light and liberty of the gospel, and he is now an earnest Christian worker."


We have seen something of the good hand of God upon us here. I do not know how many have professed conversion. I think in the twenty-five years I have baptized somewhere between two and three thousand people in this baptistry, and many others have professed conversion. I was thinking of it the other day, and wondering where they all are. After all it would be no compliment to us, or to the ministry of this church, if they had all stayed at home. A real ministry has a scattering effect: "They that were scattered abroad went everywhere preaching the word."

I have been greatly heartened by hearing these words from our students. One time, a little while ago, when the depression that is without seemed to get within, I sat down, and, without paper or pencil, just from memory—I suppose I could have enlarged it had I had the record—I counted up the students that I knew of, and then allowed them the smallest possible number of people as a congregation, and discovered that our students alone are addressing every Sunday, morning and evening, far more people than this building, if it were packed to its capacity, could contain. The Seminary is only about seven or eight years old, and it will go on through the years to come until many hundreds of ministers and missionaries will be preaching the gospel the world over.

I must not detain you this morning. Perhaps I may say a little more this evening. The children are with us, and I am under a kind of pledge to them—although I think they will allow me a little lattitude this morning. I try always to conclude the morning service at twelve o'clock, or rather to announce the invitation hymn at twelve o'clock. So do not be nervous, I shall not attempt to preach this morning, although I had a sermon in my mind, and if you had only told me, Brother Brown, I might have had two or three more hours' sleep last night, but I knew nothing of your plans.

I am most grateful for having Brother Greenway representing the Deacons and Church on this platform, because he is one of the comrades in arms. In those days when things were difficult he stood solidly by. The other day I met a gentleman who fifteen years ago, or thereabouts, gave an interview to the paper in which he said in effect that Dr. Shields did not like little children and young people, and young people did not like him. Of course that was only an excuse, in the midst of the fight; but how wonderfully God has answered our critics in giving us what is, so far as I am aware, the largest Sunday School of any denomination in the entire Dominion of Canada. And these little children always please me. We have them here every Sunday morning, this great throng of young people. I am glad they sang that hymn: "We'll never part again". I should like to hear that again to-night. Will you sing it for me?

Many of the names which have been read to you are names which I treasure very highly. Some of them are names of people with whom I have had no very intimate acquaintance,

for they have been touched rather through the printed message than a personal one; but I am thankful to God for what He has brought to pass. No one but God could have enabled

us to continue unto this day.

Perhaps I had better not, at this late hour, attempt to say more this morning, but if you will come this evening I will try to preach to you. I believe the Lord will give us a message, and a good time. It is significant that on this corner, where so many battles have been fought, battles for the faith once for all delivered to the saints, God should have enabled us to set up, and maintain, an influence which has literally touched, and is touching, even now, every week, the uttermost parts of the earth. There is scarcely a country in the world from which we do not hear, and in from fifty to sixty of them the ministry of this church circulates every, week through the printed page.

I did not know that you had been in touch with these people, or that you had had any word from them. A message was read from Rev. Percy Hicks. He has been Editor of The Christian Herald for forty years, standing always for the faith. That paper has a circulation of a quarter of a million, two hundred and sixty thousand to be exact; and it reaches every corner of the earth. I doubt not that many of these communications which have come, have come from people whom the printed word has been touching week by

week.

Most sincerely, and with all the strength of my heart, I thank you all for your loyalty, for all your kindness, some of you through the entire twenty-five years. Others have

been here for a shorter period.

I think perhaps we ought to close now, but let me say this one word: after all, even in this day, there is nothing that interests people, nothing that ministers to human need like the gospel of the grace of God. It is not worn out: it is as sufficient and as mighty as ever, and is still the "power of God unto salvation to every one that believeth". Some of you here this morning have been converted for some time, and have never been baptized. But you ought to have been. Some of you who worship with us regularly are Christians, and you have not joined in the fellowship of the church, and you ought to do so. I have had no opportunity to give you a message this morning, but you have heard the gospel again and again, and, just like that Roman Catholic, perhaps some word of God is in your heart: "The word is nigh thee, even in thy mouth and in thy heart: that is the one word of faith which we preach." There is no reason why you should not trust Christ this morning. That would be the best way of celebrating this twenty-five years, for a large number to come to Christ, and for others to seek a fuller consecration to His service.

The Evening Service

It was our privilege at the evening service to sit in the audience. The Senior Choir occupied their usual seats. Then the Junior Choir followed to crowd the space between the choir and the front pews. Indeed, Mr. W. J. Hutchinson, our Choir Leader and Bible School Superintendent, reminded us of the

"old woman who lived in a shoe,

She had so many children she didn't know what to do", the difference being that Mr. Hutchinson did know!

Dr. Shields and Rev. W. S. Whitcombe entered, and the evening worship proceeded about as usual, with hearty congregational singing of the grand hymns of the Church, reverend reading of the Word of God, and earnest prayer for Divine blessing, till the Pastor returned to the platform after the baptism. Thereupon Deacon Greenway came forward and read the following address:

"Dear Pastor:

Jarvis Street Baptist Church loves its Pastor, and it loves to say so. On your Silver Jubilee in this Church, both our heads and our hearts have reasons for the affection in which we hold you.

Through evil report and good report, you have stood faithfully by the principle of the grace of God in your

preaching and teaching; His Son, the crucified exalted Christ, you have upheld to us as the all-sufficient Saviour

The greetings from far and near, read at this morning's service, reveal in such a vivid way the tremendous influence of your preaching, both here and through THE GOSPEL WITNESS, that we are fully justified in calling you a teacher of teachers, a preacher of preachers and a pastor of pastors. They showed again that your stand for the Faith has been a bulwark to many who have, at times, grown weary in the fight.

You have shown us the way in Christian work. Our Bible School has grown from small proportions to be the largest school in the land. The crowds of its younger members marching into this auditorium on Sunday mornings bring a thrill to all who witness the sight. What this ministry means, and will mean, in the lives of a multitude of the young, many of whom would be otherwise religiously destitute, is beyond the estimate of even those who know it best.

Toronto Baptist Seminary, which you led in founding eight and a half years ago, has multiplied your power many times. The messages we heard this morning from men and women who trained in the Seminary bear ample witness to that fact. We thank God for those who have gone forth, and for those now in training, because we see in them a generation of ministers of the Evangel in the years to come, should He tarry.

Because of its world-wide possibilities, we are most desirous that the Seminary should continue to grow. Accordingly, in honour of your Silver Jubilee, and to aid this work which lies so near to your heart, we have done what we knew would bring you the greatest possible joy, and created a fund, made up of gifts from the students themselves, from interested individuals, from churches of our Union, but mainly of the self-sacrificing gifts of the departments of our Bible School and members of Jarvis Street Church. The amount is not yet complete, for several other churches are planning to have a part-indeed, we hope this fund may be but the beginning of such a flow of practical good will toward this School of the prophets as will fully meet its needs. But we ask you to accept, for the Seminary, in the hope that it will lighten some of the burden, and as a token in which we hold you as founder and President, this cheque of \$6,105.00, the result to date of the Dr. Shields' Jubilee Seminary Fund."

Following the address, the great audience rose and again sang the Doxology.

"I Heartily Endorse This Cheque!"

The light on the Doctor's face was a study. Taking the cheque for \$6,105.00 he repeated the words of one who was unaccustomed to banking and when instructed by the teller to endorse a cheque, wrote on the back, "I heartily endorse this cheque!" Dr. Shields endorsed the cheque and returned it to Mr. Greenway, who is Treasurer of the Church also. The Pastor's delight over the contributions toward the Seminary was expressed in the evening sermon, printed in this Jubilee Edition. The text was one of those which, under certain circumstances, simply unrolls, illustrates and applies itself. We are not in the habit of shouting much, but while a few Amens were audible to us, Heaven must have heard a great chorus of others from a church filled with rejoicing people.

It was a great day of thanksgiving to God. The closing hymn was appropriate, "All hail the power of Jesus' name", and how the people sang it!

Another "Surprise Party"-Monday Evening

Monday evening we had another "surprise party". Sunday had seen public affairs, this was a family gathering. The Lecture Hall was filled, galleries, class rooms, and

Choir rendered "The King of Love" as an anthem; there were vocal solos by one of the ladies of the Seminary and by a boy and girl of the Bible School and by Mr. Fred Syme, violin solos and a number by the orchestra. One after another leaders of the deacons, the various departments of the Bible School, the women's societies, the Seminary and the Union gave their congratulations to Dr. Shields, assuring the Pastor and his wife of our loyalty

hall-ways. The Senior Choir occupied the gallery to the right (as one looked toward the platform), and the Junior, that to the left. The people crowded all available chairs. Just after we had begun the first hymn, "O God, our help in ages past", Deacon O. L. Raymer ushered Dr. Shields upstairs and into the Hall. He did not know what he had come to; indeed, he thought he was coming to teach the usual Bible lesson to the workers of our great Sunday morning School. His face was a study once more when he realized "what was up". Mrs. Shields came from the back and sat down beside him. We prayed, we read Psalm 20 responsively. Deacon Greenway, assisted by Mr. Hutchinson, presided over the programme of felicitations, presentations and music. The youngsters sang some of their choruses; the

to them, and expressed the hope that God might spare them for many more years of service among us.

"Like a Tree Planted by the Rivers of Water"

Rev. W. W. Fleischer, Pastor of the Fenelon Falls Baptist Church and Instructor in Church History in the Seminary, spoke on behalf of our School of the Prophets. He told of the first impression which Dr. Shields made on him when he, as a boy, first saw him; of how the Lord used a sermon in Jarvis St. to lift the burden on him as a college student; and of what joy he personally found in association with him in the work of the Seminary. His ministry, he said, was that of the blessed man of Psalm 1,—a tree planted by the rivers of water, bearing fruit, with no withering leaves.

Flowers and Gardens

Rev. W. S. Whitcombe read some further greetings that had come that day, announced additions to the Dr. Shields Jubilee Seminary Fund, and then proceeded in a brief, humorous address to pay to the Church Secretary, who is also Treasurer of the Seminary, Miss Violet Stoakley, a glowing tribute for the way in which she had been the moving spirit in the plans to celebrate this Jubilee. Mr. W. J. Hutchinson followed with more sense and nonsense in the same vein! Mrs. W. Gordon Brown thereupon presented Miss Stoakley with a lovely basket of talisman roses and purple iris in appreciation of these and many, many other long and faithful efforts.

It was now my duty and privilege to tell Dr. and Mrs. Shields that, while we had made our big effort yesterday in something that we knew would please the Pastor more than anything else, namely the raising of funds for the pressing needs of the Seminary, we felt also that we must do something a bit personal. We remembered that they loved a garden. Indeed, the Pastor wrote about a year ago in The Gospel Witness of some practical spiritual lessons he had learned from his garden. A garden we had right there! Thoughtful minds and skilful hands had prepared it in a room opening off the Lecture Hall. (A picture of the work will be found in this edition, page 5). And so we asked them to come into the garden"!

The Leading of the Lord

Dr. Shields replied to all we had said by expressing again how much he and Mrs. Shields appreciated our loyalty. He told a little of the unusual chain of circumstances which have since been seen as clearly providential, which led him to Jarvis St. twenty-five years ago. With the garden surprise he was delighted, and so were we. What could we better sing than the Doxology once more? Then the Pastor offered a pastoral prayer, pronounced the benediction, and began another period-may it be a very long one—of service to Jarvis St. Baptist Church and to the Church of God throughout the

How so large a number of people-men as well as women—managed to keep such a secret I cannot imagine. But they did! Even my office staff daringly intercepted my mail, and kept from me every communication that contained any reference to the proposed Silver Jubilee celebrations.

I have no language with which to express my grati-tude to God for these twenty-five years' mercies; nor can I adequately express my loving appreciation of the manifest loyalty of Jarvis Street members. Noth-ing they could have done could have given me such deep and joyous satisfaction as their generous gift to the Seminary Fund. I am grateful alike to those who conceived the plan and to those who executed it; and to all the friends of Jarvis Street Church. The Seminary, and "The Gospel Witness", who contributed to the Seminary Tubiles Fund: and to all the friends to the Seminary Jubilee Fund; and to all the friends, far and near, who have kindly sent expressions of interest and goodwill. The letters advising our friends of the anniversary were sent out absolutely without my knowledge. With all my heart I thank you and pray that God may bless you all.

The Iarvis Street Pulpit

"A FRUITFUL BOUGH BY A WELL"

A Sermon by the Pastor, Dr. T. T. Shields

Preached in Jarvis Street Baptist Church, Toronto, Sunday Evening, May 19th, 1935

(Stenographically Reported)

"Joseph is a fruitful bough, even a fruitful bough by a well; whose branches run over the wall:

"The archers have sorely grieved him, and shot at him, and hated him:
"But his bow abode in strength, and the arms of his hands were made strong by the hands of the mighty God of Jacob."—Genesis 49: 22-24.

I should, I think, be less than human, as a man, and basely ungrateful as a minister, if I were not deeply touched by the expressions of kindness and of Christian loyalty which so far have characterized the services of the day. It has been gracious of the people who constitute the membership of this church, and of members and ministers of other churches who share with us in the fellowship of the gospel, so kindly to express their love and loyalty after these twenty-five years.

During the celebrations in connection with the Empire's recognition of the silver jubilee of His Majesty the King, there were certain things that came very clearly to my own mind. The death of King Edward occurred just as I was concluding my ministry in London, and the accession of King George occurred nine days before it was my privilege to assume the pastorate of this church. Ours has been a very small sphere, and yet I have sometimes wondered if the task of the King is much greater than that of the pastor of a large city church. I know it is greater in a thousand ways, but perhaps not very much more difficult.

This crowning expression of your loyal determination to continue to co-operate in the work of the Lord which has its centre in this place touches me deeply. I know something of the financial resources of this church, and I know that, following so closely upon the conclusion of our church year, when we always make a special effort to meet all our obligations, this magnificent sum of six thousand, one hundred, and five dollars for the Seminary Fund must be representative of very real sacrifice on the part of a great many people. I was asked a little while ago by a friend who is not a member of this church, but always interested, if it was true that, in order to maintain our work and to meet our obligations, it had been necessary for us heavily to mortgage the church property. I said, "Whatever put that into your ·mind?" "It is pretty freely circulated, that that is how Jarvis Street Church has managed to finance its affairs during the depression." I need not tell you there is not a word of truth in the report. Jarvis Street has closed its books every year since nineteen hundred and fourteen, without a single exception, without a deficit. We had a deficit in the Seminary Fund, but it is not often that a single church assays the task of maintaining an educational institution. The Seminary has been maintained, very largely, by Jarvis Street Church, although we have had some magnificent gifts from friends outside from time to time.

I am deeply grateful for this contribution to our Seminary Fund, which, I admit, has been an occasion of anxiety to me. This does not quite discharge our obliga-

tion on Seminary account, but I am sure that it will be an inspiration to the friends of our work, and in later time we shall hear from others. It is not often that one who has received a gift can be bold enough to ask for a larger one, but as it is for the maintenance of this most worthy cause, Toronto Baptist Seminary, I am sure you will allow me to say that I hope you will all pray that the Lord will multiply these gifts until at last we may be in such a position as to be able to carry our work without anxiety. We have no endowment fund, and the Seminary is maintained solely by the gifts of God's people. The fee for students is a nominal one, designed to serve only as a guarantee of good faith on their part; hence the Seminary is a religious Oliver Twist, and is always asking for more. But I am thankful from the bottom of my heart. I thank all the friends who have made this splendid gift possible.

This morning there was no time for a sermon, but I want to speak to you this evening, if you will bear with me, from a text which I think is illustrative of our experience as a church, although of course, it finds its chief exemplification in Joseph's great Antitype, and only through Him in the experience of the Christian church as His body.

When Jacob pronounced a blessing upon his sons, he said of Joseph, "Joseph is a fruitful bough, even a fruitful bough by a well; whose branches run over the wall: the archers have sorely grieved him, and shot at him, and hated him: but his bow abode in strength, and the arms of his hands were made strong by the hands of the mighty God of Jacob; (from thence is the shepherd, the stone of Israel)." The last clause is a direct reference to a Greater than Joseph, of Whom the words were, and are, profoundly true. Being true of our Lord Jesus, they are true also of His church, to the extent in which she is conformed to His will, for He often promised the church that His experiences should be theirs: "If the world hate you, ye know that it hated me before it hated you"; "If they have kept my saying, they will keep yours also"; "As my Father hath sent me, even so send I you." As members of the body of Jesus Christ, members of the church composed of people who have been made new creatures in Christ, and in whose hearts, by faith, He dwelleth, I think we may lay claim to this implied promise, and say that this word should be true of every Christian church, and that, in some measure—a very small measure, we admit, it is true of us. We mourn that we have so imperfectly followed after Him, and that our united ministry has not been more fruitful; yet we can give God thanks that in principle we have seen it somewhat exemplified in our own experience.

I.

Here is A FIGURE WHICH I THINK WE MAY APPROPRIATE TO OURSELVES AS A CHURCH. We ought to be as Joseph was, "a fruitful bough, even a fruitful bough by a well; whose branches run over the wall".

The conception given us in the New Testament, I fear, differs at many points from that which is commonly entertained in our day. Men speak of churches as though they could be measured by carnal standards, as though a Christian church might be compared with merely human and temporal organizations. One church is very influential because it has in its membership many people who are highly placed in the social scale, and is therefore noted for its social influence. Another is remarkable because it has in its membership certain men of great wealth, and it is said that it is a wealthy church. Some other church perhaps may be chiefly remarkable for the aesthetic character of its services, its music, its ritualall the things that minister to delightful intellectual refinement. If people effect a superior air, and desire to be classed with the intellectually superior, they let it be known that they are in the habit of attending a certain church. Perhaps they do, and perhaps some of them enjoy a very comfortable sleep while in attendance!

Sometimes a church is noted for its pulpit. Its minister has a reputation in some instance for great scholarship. He has a large number of degrees. Nobody knows what they represent, perhaps, but that does not matter. He has a scholastic reputation, and because of that, whatever he says, though it may be the veriest nonsense, is regarded as the word of an oracle. Another minister strikes a popular vein, and he is said to be remarkably eloquent, and most thrillingly entertaining in his deliverances. His church consequently affords an interesting Sunday evening diversion.

What leagues of distance separate these carnal estimates of what a church is, or ought to be, from that of New Testament standards!

The figure of our text is often employed to represent the church of God. Our Lord Himself said, "I am the vine, ye are the branches: He that abideth in me, and I in him, the same bringeth forth much fruit." speaks of the plants which His heavenly Father hath planted, and says that all others "shall be rooted out". The general tenor of His teaching, and that of the epistles that follow, and of the apostolic era recorded in the Acts of the Apostles which they illustrate, as well as the teaching of the prophetic scriptures of the Old Testament, is to the effect that the church of the Lord Jesus is not an ornament, it does not spread itself like a green bay tree, it is not remarkable for its foliage; but is remarkable for its fruit. It is like "a fruitful bough". A church ought to bear fruit; it ought to have a pronounced moral effect upon the lives of men; it ought to multiply itself, making others, like itself, to become new creatures in Christ Jesus.

We do not—we cannot—ignore the material aspect of a church's life, or of the work of the Lord in general—as testified by the cheque for over six thousand dollars which Mr. Greenway just handed me for the Seminary. All these material concerns have value. But if this church were made up of men and women of large means, millionaires and multimillionaires, if we were able to meet every material necessity without anxiety, and without labour, and had vast amounts in our exchequer, but

yet were without spiritual fruit, unable to show, by God's good grace, that this church has been, and still is, the workshop of the Holy Ghost, where the creative energy of God Himself is still exercised, in remaking men into His own image and likeness—if that were lacking, and if it should ever be lacking in the life of this church, then the only good reason for its continued existence will have departed: "Herein is my Father glorified, that ye bear much fruit."

I am thankful to God that that has been true, in some measure, of our united ministry in this place. How the Lord has blessed it, I cannot say. I am full of disappointment in the accomplishments of Jarvis Street Church. I have had dreams of higher and better things. And yet I am thankful that it can be said—and those who know this church, and know the lives of its members, and what marvellous miracles of grace, unmistakably the work of God, have been accomplished in the lives of multitudes of people-whether people like us or not, they must in candour admit that God has been in the midst of us, and that this church has been-and praise God still is in large measure—"a fruitful bough". We have not many leaves perhaps, not much to write about in the paper, but we are still bearing fruit to the honour and glory of God.

That has been so in respect to the conversions which have taken place here, hundreds of them. Literally thousands during the course of these twenty-five years have professed that in this place God the Holy Ghost has touched them, and made them to become new creatures.

But that is not the only fruit we bear. Important as it is that people should be saved, it is almost equally important that they should be built up in their most holy faith. How many people who were once earnest Christians, people about whose conversion, so far as one can judge, there could be no doubt, we have seen starved until they had become as lean as Pharaoh's kine, utterly useless to themselves, or to the kingdom of God, withered branches bearing no fruit! It is one of the joys of an extended ministry that one stays long enough to see some people grow up. There are young men and women in this church this evening whom I knew first as little children. They have grown up in our midst, they have come to know the Lord, and have become stalwarts of the faith, serving the Lord with full purpose of heart. I have seen others of maturer years who were found of the Lord in this place. I have noted their testimony. Oh, how elementary it was in the beginning! How little they knew of the gospel! They knew that Jesus died for sinners, and that they were saved through faith in Him. But I have watched you—I have not told you—I have watched you, listened to your testimonies and your prayers; and have known from them where you had been brousing. I have seen something of what you have learned from the Word of God. It has been a joy very often to hear men in their prayers give such unmistakable evidence of the fact that they have been grasped by the great truth that we are saved by the sovereign grace of God, and not by our own efforts.

We do not know anything, as Christians, until we clearly apprehend that fact. But when that great truth dawns upon a man, and he comes to see that he is everlastingly indebted to redeeming grace, then the root of the matter is manifestly in him; and he will grow—mark this—he will grow, not "into" grace, but "grow in

grace, and in the knowledge of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ". I rejoice in what I have seen of the fruit of this fruitful bough in these twenty-five years. I have seen very many "rooted and built up in him, and stablished in the faith, as ye have been taught, abounding therein with thanksgiving".

"Joseph is a fruitful bough". But there was one peculiarity about this bough, that it was even like a "fruitful bough by a well". Its roots went right down into the soil, and when rain and dew for a time ceased to fall, and when verdure vanished, and there was no longer any fruit on the trees, yonder was one tree that still retained its verdure and its fruitfulness. What made the difference?

So was it with Joseph. When there was a famine in all lands, and all the people went down to Egypt to buy corn, they said everywhere, "There is famine in other quarters, but there is corn in Egypt." And it was because Joseph was "a fruitful bough, even a fruitful bough by a well". The roots were watered, and the branches were nourished, and it continued to bear fruit when other trees about were withered in the prevailing drought. I desire to speak with care. I do not want to say a word that would sound as though we affected, or even assumed, any sort of superiority; but it is a fact that God, in the midst of barrenness, when there is a famine of hearing the word of the Lord, and when newspapers, magazines, and books, in the aggregate by multiplied millions are telling people that the gospel is outworn, that this day and age will not listen to a gospel of blood, or to any message of supernaturalism—in the midst of barrenness I dare to say that God, in His providence, has made this church like "a fruitful bough, even a fruitful bough by a well".

My brethren, you do not need any other gospel, do you? You do not want any amendment to the gospel of the cross, do you? You will suffer no diminution from its glory and authority, nor do you ask for any addition to the completeness of its revelation. We believe in the absolute finality of the gospel of Jesus Christ; and, so far as I am concerned, if God should spare us for other years, and when I am gone should spare this church to complete another century if He should tarry, and if He should send to this pulpit a succession of Bible-ministers to preach the Word of God, I will venture to say that up to the last syllable of recorded time, this weary world will need no other gospel than that gospel which we have preached. We will suffer no infringement, upon its copyright. He Who is our Saviour is the Author and Finisher of our faith, the Alpha and Omega, the Sum-total of God's disclosure of Himself to a sinful world. We need nothing else. We will have nothing else. And may God grant that the day may never come when any other note should be sounded from this pulpit than that which makes the centre of its theme the gospel of Jesus Christ and Him crucified.

I know what this church would have been if it had had no gospel. It would have been like other downtown churches, some of them vainly struggling by one sensation after another, to get people to go to church. I do not know why they should go. I would not cross the street to hear a Modernist preach. I would not waste my time sitting at the feet of a man who does not put the crown of Deity upon the brow of Jesus Christ, and who does not believe with all his heart, and preach with

all his might, the sufficiency of the salvation effected by the death and resurrection of the Lord of glory. It is simple, I know, but it is adequate, as adequate as the sun to light this material world. If it be so that God has helped us thus far, it is because this church has been "a fruitful bough, even a fruitful bough by a well".

What is the well? You heard it defined to-night as Mr. Whitcombe read to you. And what is true of a man is true of a church. The man who refuses to "walk in the counsel of the ungodly", who says, "I will have none of your doctrine of doubt"; the man who standeth not "in the way of sinners, nor sitteth in the seat of the scornful. But his delight is in the law of the Lord; and in his law doth he meditate day and night"—what shall happen to him? "He shall be like a tree planted by the rivers of water, that bringeth forth its fruit in his season; his leaf also shall not wither; and whatsoever he doeth shall prosper."

I marvel that this church has been maintained financially, but I believe that the principle of the text is true even financially, for it was true in a material sense so far as Joseph was concerned. Egypt had corn when everybody else was starving. I do not mean to say that we have much money in this church: we have not. This church has been maintained because, poor as we are, we have honoured Him Whose is the wealth of the worldand He has provided for us. This last year of the depression, the hardest year we have ever known, the church had a larger income than in former times when there were millionaires in its membership. Never in those old days did this church raise so much money as it did this last year. It closed its books with a balance in all funds, with the exception of the Seminary Fund, which is an extra-church matter. If you hear anybody speak of our mortgaging the church to carry on, tell them it is not true, but that Jarvis Street is as "a fruitful bough by a well". God, in His sovereign mercy, has provided for

"Even as a fruitful bough by a well, whose branches run over the wall." I wonder did we any of us, when we were boys, see a fruit-tree like that? Did you? A tree bowed down with fruit, and some of the branches over the wall—outside the fence. Even the women remember it—I can see by your smile that you have looked covetously at just such a bough. It hung over the wall, almost as though inviting you to help yourself to its fruit.

There are some churches that are like a little garden walled around. It seems to me there is a hymn about a "little garden walled around". That is how they do in England, build a wall around a garden. I rather like it—providing I am on the inside! I like seclusion and privacy. It is lovely to have a high wall around the garden so that nobody can see over it, and you can have everything to yourself. But I like the Canadian practice better, of leaving the garden open. Then if my neighbour has a better garden than mine, I can enjoy his; and if mine is better, he can enjoy mine.

The walled garden is a false conception of the church, save of course as it means that we are protected, garrisoned around by the Lord and His angels. But if we have the wall, let us have a tree whose branches will go over the wall. I rejoice that that is true of this church. We heard messages this morning, first from our students—but before I say anything about them, let me

tell you this. Last Fall I preached in Glasgow, and one evening a pew was full from end to end of Jarvis Street members—I felt as though I were in Toronto. But they had gone home to Scotland, and were busy about the Lord's work. I supposed I should get away from Jarvis Street in Edinburgh, but Jarvis Street members were at every meeting, without exception. At Bruntsfield Church, at the great South Leith Church of Scotland, and in the great Assembly Hall—Jarvis Street members were present. Many of them had been converted during these twenty-five years. Among them was one of our students, now a minister just outside of Edinburgh, doing splendid work, Brother Thomas McClure.

The same was true of Ireland. We have many north of Ireland members in this congregation to-night, but due to the depression many of our members have gone back to the Old Land. But during my whole series of services there was not a meeting in which Jarvis Street members were not present; and in that land they are busy for the Master.

I met a group of men in a London meeting, who had come down from Birmingham. Some years ago, when they first came to Toronto, while riding on the back of a street-car, they were met by one of our workers. They were brought to church, were converted; and two of them went back within six months. I learned they are a great spiritual force in their church at Birmingham; they are always about the Master's business. They were in Toronto only six months ten years ago, but were saved in this place, and went home on fire for the Lord; and are bearing fruit there—one of the branches that have run over the wall. And we have just such members everywhere.

I have not revised the figures, because I had not thought of any jubilee recognition; but I reviewed something of my pastorage in THE GOSPEL WITNESS two years ago. As of that date it had been my privilege to baptize two thousand, two hundred, and ninety; to receive by experience, seven hundred and twenty-nine; and by letter, one thousand, three hundred, and ninety-eight; four thousand, four hundred and seventeen for the twenty-three years. During that same period, in actual funds, there passed through the treasury of this church, one million, two hundred and sixteen thousand, one hundred and ninety-four dollars.

Someone will say, "If that be so, where are all the members now?" Many of them are outside the wall, branches running over the wall. They have been scattered to the ends of the earth. May I tell you that from the membership of this church there have gone forth in the last twelve years more ministers and missionaries than in the rest of its more than one hundred years of history. Where are they? In China, in Africa, South America, Jerusalem, Jamaica, in the Provinces of Quebec, Ontario, Manitoba, Saskatchewan, Alberta and British Columbia; and in the United States. To many parts of the United States and Canada they have gone forth from this place preaching the gospel.

And not as lay-members only. One day not long ago I felt depressed because the work was not as fruitful as I should like to see it on the branches inside the wall, and, if you will allow me the metaphor, I climbed the ladder to see the branches on the outside of the wall. Without paper and pencil, but from memory only, I recalled the names of students who have gone forth

from the Seminary; and while they perhaps serve small churches, they preach every Sunday to far more people than could get into this building were it crowded to its utmost capacity. This church has multiplied itself. It has branches—fruitful branches—over the wall, bringing forth fruit to the praise and glory of God's name. For this we give God thanks; may it ever be so! There must be something wrong with the spiritual life of young men if, on hearing the gospel preached, it does not create within them a desire to preach or teach.

Some churches produce broilers. You know how the producers put chicks into pens, where they cannot move, and feed them all they can possibly eat; then when they have grown, and put on flesh without developing any muscle, they sell them for "broilers". There are a great many Christian broilers—but since they cannot be eaten they are good for nothing. There are some orthodox people who do nothing but eat. They sit in a pew and receive the Word, and say, "Hallelujah!" But they do nothing. It is the duty of every Christian, receiving the Word of God, and having Christ in the heart, to bear witness to that great fact.

If the Lord has blessed us these years, it is because He has raised up a great company of people to be preachers of the gospel—I do not mean in an official sense, but always witnessing for Christ. Thank God for the branches over the wall!

II.

Here we have A TARGET FOR THE ARCHERS: "The archers have sorely grieved him, and shot at him, and hated him." That is what Jacob said of Joseph, and it was true of the Greater than Joseph. How the archers grieved Him! They were always lying in wait to catch something out of His mouth. He was surrounded with people who endeavoured to discount or misrepresent everything He did. That was His lot. And not only that, they shot at Him. They hated Him.

Some of you Jarvis Street people think that your lot is a peculiar one. I wonder if I may say, without offence, and without being egotistical, that I have often thanked God for the opportunity of setting you an example. The archers have drawn a bow at me on more than one occasion, as they have at you; and at this church. You say, "Why is it so?" You need not ask that question. "They hated me without a cause." If you are true to Christ, if you stand by His Word, if you refuse to have any fellowship with the unfruitful works of darkness, but rather by your testimony, reprove them, the archers will sorely grieve you. It is no compliment to a minister-perhaps you will wonder at this—when he is toasted by the Rotary Club, by the Lions, the Tigers, and all the rest of it; and when, on his appearance, they sing, "For he's a jolly good fellow." Before sinful men he must bear witness to his Lord, and when he does he will pass through Joseph's experience. As members of this church you have had it. Scores in the course of the last few years-I think I might almost say hundreds—have told me of the difficulties they have at their places of work. Every conceivable means are employed to irritate, to attack, persecute them,—the archers take aim! Do not be alarmed at that: it is the common lot of an avowed Christian. This vile world was never a friend to grace to help us on to God, it is not now-it never will be. In the

measure in which you conform to the will of God, you must, in relation to the world, be a non-conformist.

"The archers have sorely grieved him." To be the object of his brethren's displeasure was no pleasure to Joseph; it was no pleasure to our Lord; it is no pleasure to us. I think I am one of the most agreeable men in the world! I do not see why anybody could not live with me! I do not know why anybody should find it difficult to get along with me! Abide by the Book; do the best you can, as the Lord helps you, to obey the precepts of the Book; and I do not see why two people who believe the same thing should not keep step together. I have no pleasure in knowing that somebody is always taking aim at me. A lady said to me once, "I think you would rather have people say nasty things, than nice things, about you." I would not. There is no man who likes to have nice things said about him more than I. Together we endeavour to heed the admonition, "If it be possible, as much as lieth in you live peaceably with all men." But though we cannot be at peace with those who deny God's Word, we need not worry, though we are grieved. We are grieved that people should take aim at us.

"And shot at him." Did you ever have an arrow pierce you? It is not comfortable to be in the front-line trenches. I remember when I first felt the fire of the enemy. I was Pastor of the most respectable church in the world. There was nothing better than Jarvis Street — and I was as respectable as any of them. I shall never forget when I first saw my name in the paper as an object of abusive attack. I could not sleep. I said to my wife, "This is terrible, to be denounced like this."

A number of years ago I read an account of a debate in Parliament when Lord Balfour, then Mr. Arthur J. Balfour, was Prime Minister. An honourable member asked a question. Quoting from a newspaper, he wanted to know what the Prime Minister had to say in answer. Mr. Balfour said he did not know what the honourable gentleman was talking about. When the member quoted the newspaper, Mr. Balfour replied that he seldom read the papers. There are papers in this city I never read. Some people have sent me papers—I throw them in the wastepaper basket. Let the devil's archers shoot if they want to. There is a shield of faith that is able to quench all the fiery darts of the devil. Nothing can harm you if ye be followers of that which is good.

"And hated him." That was said of Joseph. Many of you are nice people. I love you all. I do not see why Jarvis Street members should be hated. I think we have some of the noblest Christian people in Jarvis Street I ever met in my life. I do not see why you should be hated, except that you belong to Jarvis Street. That is enough! You laugh at that, but let me solemnly tell you that in the midst of a crooked and perverse nation, it is the highest compliment a Christian church can be paid when its very name becomes an object of hatred with evildoers. Hated? Yes! I do not expect people who drink beer to like me. I love them, but I hate beer! and I abhor the government that is responsible for it and the other politicians who initiated it. It is ours to bear witness for God before men. Let the workers of iniquity, Premier Hepburn included, shoot at us if they want to. We do not enjoy it. I would rather have bouquets than bricks any time; but if bouquets are reserved for those who condone error, and acquiesce in evil-doing, I would rather be stoned, like Stephen, than compromise.

I will tell you what I was going to preach from this morning if Brother Brown and some others had not robbed me of the time! This was to have been my text, "No weapon that is formed against thee shall prosper; and every tongue that shall rise against thee in judgment thou shalt condemn. This is the heritage of the servants of the Lord, and their righteousness is of me, saith the Lord." The same truth is in our text of the evening.

III.

We come now to our third observation, THE EXPERI-ENCE OF DIVINE REINFORCEMENT: "But his bow abode in strength, and the arms of his hands were made strong by the hands of the mighty God of Jacob; (from thence is the shepherd, the stone of Israel)", Jacob prophetically added. That is the secret of it all. My dear friends, these kind felicitations on this occasion may perhaps serve to advertise the fact that Jarvis Street still lives. A few years ago I heard a man with a megaphone on one of the city sight-seeing 'buses, when passing this church, say something like this, "On the left is Jarvis Street Baptist Church. A few years ago there was an explosion in that church—but you will observe the church still stands." It does! This church that used to be a local church known only in Canada to the Baptist denomination, by the blessing of God, I dare to say, is known in every country on earth to-dayknown to hundreds of thousands of people, where a few years ago it was known to ten. God has been pleased to bless the message, and I think with this growing Seminary we too may say that our bow abides in strength. We have not done fighting. We do not want to fight, but unfortunately the devil still lives, and we must contend against error wherever it appears; and remain true to the Lord Jesus.

The explanation of it all is that as truly as Joseph's position was the result of the blessing of God, so the position of this church to-day is to be accounted for solely on the ground that the Lord is with us, the mighty God of Jacob is with us still.

I have no feeling of resentment against brethren who have differed from me. It is given to some men to see a little farther into the future than some others. 'And if one does see into the future, and see yonder something inevitably coming to pass, and see that the principles which are now fostered must issue in disaster—and if he warns people, they will turn upon him and rend him if they can; but only because they do not understand. But if they are honourable, honest people, when at last they see that that testimony was true, when by the passing of years and the ordering of circumstances, a church's witness is vindicated to the uttermost parts of the earth, when Wisdom's children are grown; they will justify her, and the honest man will come and say, "We were mistaken."

Whether that will be true of us in any large measure in this life or not I cannot say. But I believe we were right in drawing bow against Modernism in all its forms. We were right in refusing to countenance the tendencies of the day, or to co-operate with organiza-

tions which were propagating unbelief, or to have fellowship with their sponsors. And when we drew our bow in such warfare we did it reluctantly. We shall always regret the necessity of differing from many whom we greatly loved. We grieved, as Joseph did to be "separated from his brethren", but we had no alternative. But we rejoice that such separation, as it always does, ministered to this church's greater fruitfulness. But it is all due to the fact that the arms of our hands have been "made strong by the hands of the mighty God of Jacob—from thence is the shepherd the stone of Israel."

And now, ere I close, I am constrained to say that these twenty-five years have only confirmed our faith in the absolute finality of the gospel of Christ. We have put it to the test. We have endeavoured to make full proof of our ministry. By the blessing of God we have proved literally in thousands of instances in this place, that the gospel without amendment is the power of God unto salvation to everyone that believeth.

Let these twenty-five years increase, at least by a little the testimony of the centuries, that Jesus Christ is the same yesterday, to-day and forever. The blood of Christ still avails for the cleansing of sin; the Holy Ghost is still with us to make men new creatures in Christ; the Bible as the Word of God, divinely inspired, infallible, supremely and sovereignly authoritative, abides as the only but adequate ground of religious

I conjure you who are still unsaved to put your trust in Christ this night, and join with this great company this evening as we sing,

> "All hail the power of Jesus' Name! Let angels prostrate fall; Bring forth the royal diadem And crown Him Lord of all!"

PIONEERING

Of the work of those who are known as Regular Baptists much is pioneering. No, we are not some new sect.—though we have actually heard of people who thought so! GOD'S GOODNESS TO ISRAEL

Lesson Text: Psalms 78-80.

Golden Text: "Help us, O God of our salvation, for the glory of thy name: and deliver us, and purge away our sins, for thy name's sake."—Psalm 79:9.

Bible School Reading: Psalm 80:1-19.

DAILY BIBLE READINGS: Monday—Ex. 16:13-24; Tuesday—Ex. 17:1-7; Wednesday—Is. 5:1-7; Thursday—2 Chron. 36:11-21; Friday—Matt. 15:10-20; Saturday—Mark

PSALM SEVENTY-EIGHT

In this psalm a partial record of Israel's history is given for the purpose of drawing attention to the gracious attitude of God, the ingratitude of the nation, and the reason for the various acts of the Lord. The study of history may be most profitable if it is pursued with the object of learning the vital principles underlying the various events recorded therein; and especially so if some competent well-versed person acts as guide in the exercise. In this case, while the words were penned by a man, they are the expressions of God. He is the Teacher, and from Him we may learn the deep things of the past, and the gracious lessons of the present.

The psalm opens with a declaration respecting the psalmist's intention of making known matters relating to the

The psalm opens with a declaration respecting the psalmist's intention of making known matters relating to the national history. Note the beneficial effect of such a recounting of facts, affecting both intellectual and spiritual life; and giving warning and guidance concerning individual actions. Following this, mention is made of the establishment of the divine law in Israel (vs. 5-8). The fact and purpose of this are clearly stated; and the privilege, responsibility, and duties, arising therefrom are likewise clearly evident. The Israelites lacked excuse for forsaking God, and being disobedient to His will; and persons living in lands where the Bible is circulated freely are similarly situated. evident. The Israelites lacked excuse for forsaking God, and being disobedient to His will; and persons living in lands where the Bible is circulated freely are similarly situated, and will be held to the same accountability (Rom. 1:20). We have much reason to rejoice these days in the wonderful corroborations of scriptural truth in the realm of archaeological investigation. The mounds, the monuments, the papyri, the pottery, and the other remnants of the buried past, are making clear their history to the scientific investigator, as being identically the same as that revealed in holy writ. So clear is this evidence, and so true are the statements of Scripture, they make the suppositions of the higher critic seem exceedingly foolish. In fact, Modernism is now proved not only to be wrong, but to be out of date, and based entirely upon the imagination. The person upto-date is the one who believes the old Book.

The record of God's dealings with Israel begins with a statement respecting the disobedience of Ephrais (vs. 9-11), intimating possibly the leadership of this tribe nationally, in this attitude. Note the possibility and dangers of backsliding, the influence of such a course on others, and the attitude of God in the matter (Hos. 14:1). The marvellous works of God are then recounted, together with the failures of His people. He led His people through the Red Sea, and supplied their need in the wilderness; yet they rebelled against Him, and brought down upon themselves His wrath. As a result of this they turned again unto God, though not nerfectly: and He forgrave them, in remembrance of the fact

As a result of this they turned again unto God, though not perfectly; and He forgave them, in remembrance of the fact perfectly; and He forgave them, in remembrance of the fact that they were but flesh. Note the compassion of God, manifest in relation to Israel (2 Chron. 36:15), and through Christ (Matt. 20:34), and His wondrous grace in blessing sinners in these days (I. Cor. 15:10). Notwithstanding their experience, the Israelites again and again rebelled against God, forgetting His gracious work on their behalf, and suffered the divine punishment as a consequence (vs. 40-72). Observe the stubborn sinfulness of the people of Israel, the utter foolishness of their attitude, the divine forsaking of Ephraim for Judah (vs. 67, 68), and the Lord's choice of David (vs. 70-72). It is of interest to note that God's choice of Israel was not on account of any special qualities in that nation, but wholly due to His grace, and the same may be said of the divine choice of sinners (Eph. 1:6). Why do people rebel against God, and neglect His salvation? How may we learn useful lessons from the past? How may we prevent backsliding?

PSALM SEVENTY-NINE

This psalm has as a background the overthrow of Jerusalem, with its consequent slaying of multitudes of its people; and is a prayer to God for deliverance, ending with a promise and is a prayer to God for deliverance, ending with a promise of the state of thanksgiving for an answer thereto. It opens with a description of the desolation of the city, with a defiled temple, a city laid on heaps, with multitudes of dead lying exposed to the elements for lack of persons to bury them; the whole bringing reproach upon the nation, and stirring up the scorn and derision of the surrounding nations. This gives us a picture similar to that portrayed in psalm seventy-four, and may refer to the same event. In both the lamentable condition of Israel is made clear, and evokes pity and regret, especially when we remember that the people need never have suffered in such a manner. Their suffering was due to their sin. It should also be noted that all the suffering in the world is due to sin. Our attitude toward it then should be one of uncompromising hatred, first in ourselves, and then in others; while at the same time having compassion on those under its power, and seeking to win them from its grasn.

After referring to the desolation of the city, the psalmist rays to God for the pouring out of the divine wrath upon his nation's enemies who knew not the Lord. He asks how long they would be allowed to endure their distress, how long the anger of God would last against them. Severe chastisement seems long, even though it be of short duration. It is

ment seems long, even though it be of short duration. It is better to be obedient, and bear the cross, than disobedient, and endure chastisement. The petition to take action against the heathen follows (vs. 6, 7); then a humble request for help in manifestation of the divine mercy; concluding with the promise of thanksgiving (vs. 8-13). Note the desire of the psalmist for the glory of God.

Prayers go unanswered when offered for selfish reasons (Jas. 4:3). The glory of God should be our motive in all our plans and actions. "Man's chief end is to glorify God, and to enjoy him forever." Observe also the appeal to the mercy of God. We cannot appeal to His righteousness or justice, for we cannot measure up to the one, and it would mean punishment for us if the other were exercised; but the mercy of God is great enough to take in the worst sinner, and to cover every sin (Heb. 7:25). And God hears the cry of the oppressed (Ex. 8:9, 10). How do we know God is interested in us? How may we show forth His praise to others?

PSALM EIGHTY

This psalm records another complaint of the psalmist in a time of great national calamity. We know not the period referred to, although there are some who think it relates to the time of the captivity. It opens with a request to God to listen to the appeal of the psalmist. Note the designation of God as the "shepherd of Israel"; and as the One "that dwellest between the cherubims"; the latter referring to the visible place of His contact with His people. In the first is implied the divine care over Israel, so well known to David (Ps. 23:1), and other saints of God (Is. 40:10, 11); and in both the Lord's close relationship to His people is clearly evident. This request is followed by an appeal to God to come in strength and save His people; to turn them God to come in strength and save His people; to turn them God to come in strength and save His people; to turn them again; and cause His face to shine upon them—referring no doubt to a turning of the captivity, and liberation from enemy bondage. Note the possibility of liberation from spiritual bondage (John 8:36). A description is then given of the condition of the Lord's people. They were in great affliction, being fed with the bread of tears; and they were a laughing stock unto their neighbours, and a broken down vine destroyed by the hands of the enemies (vs. 4-16). And the psalm closes with another appeal to the Lord to turn them again that they might be saved. Note the significance of the figure of the vine in both the Old and New Testaments (Is. 5:1-7; John 15:1-8).

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
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
